They feature soldiers who fought in the War, from photographs produced and sold under the title 'Crimean Heroes' in 1856. The Queen's silhouette and value/service indicator are positioned at top right, and the identity of the soldiers and the inscription THE CRIMEAN WAR 1854-1856 are printed at the foot. The stamps were designed by Atelier Works using photographs by Cundall and Howlett, courtesy of the Director, National Army Museum, London

The War was the first conflict to be comprehensively photographed. Roger Fenton, who travelled to the Crimea with the patronage of Prince Albert, is often regarded as the first war photographer. The 'Crimean Heroes' series, shown on the stamps, was photographed by Joseph Cundall and Robert Howlett of the Photographic Institution of London in June and July 1856. Most of the images were taken at Aldershot where returning troops congregated for a grand London parade. The Heroes series was for general sale, and copies were sent to Queen Victoria, who had earlier commissioned Cundall and Howlett to photograph disabled war veterans.

An exhibition 'A Most Desperate Undertaking' telling the story of the Crimean War from the soldiers' perspective is on at the National Army Museum, Royal Hospital Road, London sw3 until October. The Museum is open daily 10.00-17.30, admission free. Enquiries: 020 7730 0717.

Heroes' return to mark the war's anniversary

Orders for serviced fdcs with the stamps cancelled by a pictorial first day postmark of Tallents House Edinburgh or London sw3 must reach Tallents House (address below) by the day of issue. Price £4.25 uk, £3.62 overseas.
